Letter from the Executive Director

2023 was a year like no other! We celebrated our twentieth anniversary championing sexual and reproductive health and rights for students and youth. SAYWHAT magnified the 2-decade milestone by introducing new innovations to help young people embrace their public health including Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights in the digital era.

We managed to launch the Smart Leaners Hub, an online learning platform offering free SRH courses and certification. 2023 also saw the launch of our first SRH-GBV short film titled "CHOICES" by young people who won the Creative Reproductive health Arts Festival for Transformation (CRAFT). Through CHOICES, young people amplified their voices on emerging challenges affecting their education and health including the scourge of drug and substance abuse and mental health through art. In addition, the 2-year-old Young Researchers Initiative Program launched its first research book titled "Empowering young voices: Unveiling the hidden realities of young people in Zimbabwe". The insights generated from these research papers informed the implementation of interventions by young SRH defenders in various communities.

SAYWHAT also made significant progress in strengthening impact in the Southern African region in the year 2023. Through the Girls Education Advocacy in the Region (GEAR) project, SAYWHAT enhanced advocacy efforts on quality education. We undertook a comprehensive analysis of the National Budget education allocation in Malawi and Zambia to improve the access to education for girls in rural and farming communities. Moreover, we contributed towards an environ-

ment that address the continued reproductive health of students and youth through participating in the 10-year review of the Addis-Ababa Action. In Zimbabwe, we participated in the National TB Program coordination meetings and preparatory planning processes on the United Nations High-Level-Meeting on TB, and participated in the SDG progress report writing in collaboration with country specific coalitions and the report was submitted to the United Nations General Assembly Summit.

It gives me great joy that despite the challenges of the post-COVID-19 era, SAYWHAT remains uniquely positioned to provide essential information on education and public health to students and youth. We take pride in our achievements of 2023 and the 20-year milestone extending our gratitude to all those who have supported us throughout this journey. Looking ahead, we remain steadfast in our commitment to building generations of healthy and empowered children, adolescents, students, and young people.

About SAYWHAT

SAYWHAT is a student and youth social movement birthed in 2003 with the express ambition to contribute to the existence of healthy and empowered students and youth in institutions of higher learning in Zimbabwe who thoroughly enjoy their sexual and reproductive health rights. The movement's work has been primarily led and driven by student structures (Web for Life Network for Girls and Young women and Mugota/Ixhiba Young Men's forum) in tertiary institutions and young people trained and supported as community activists and cadres in communities. The SAYWHAT movement has evolved over the years and has expanded its scope of work beyond SRHR to embrace public health, education, and child safeguarding programming. It has also spread its tentacles beyond the borders of Zimbabwe into the Southern African region, where it has established strong collaborations and networks under the Southern African Region Students and Youth Conference on sexual and reproductive health (SARSYC).

In the year 2023, with support from Amplify Change, Education Out Loud GPE, the Embassy of Sweden in Zimbabwe, Norwegian Students' and Academics' International Assistance Fund (SAIH), Stop TB Partnership, and United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA); SAYWHAT celebrated its 20th anniversary and implemented 6 projects, the Sexuality Education for Transformation (SET), the Girls Education Advocacy in the Region (GEAR), Action for Choice, the Leadership Exploration And Development (LEAD), Young people Organized for Universal access to Tuberculosis and HIV Services (YOUTHS) and the sexual and Reproductive Health Education and Advocacy (REAPS) respectively.

While the Action for Choice, LEAD, REAPS and YOUTHS projects were implemented in Zimbabwe; the SET and GEAR projects were implemented across Southern Africa in Angola, Malawi, Mozambique, Zambia, and Zimbabwe. To achieve the projects objectives and realize the vision of "Generations of healthy and empowered young people across Africa" in the year 2023, SAYWHAT strengthened its 2021-2050 Action for Health and Education rights strategy that pursues 4 programming areas.

Students and Youth Organizing and Leading

We are dedicated to enhancing students and youth (including adolescents and children) agencies by empowering them to stand for and demand their health and education rights. Programming focuses on building capacity, mentoring, and coaching methods integrating health and education with issues of life skills, leadership, economic empowerment essential aspects that reduce vulnerabilities to emerging challenges and creation of more resilient young people.

Peer Educators

SAYWHAT trained students from over 45 institutions of higher learning to become peer educators who promote health-seeking behaviors among their peers and communities. Peer educators participate in information dissemination, demand generation for SRH services at orientation programs, resource centers across tertiaries, and Know Your Service Campaigns during health fairs.



Peer educators set up an information village during the 2023 Agriculture Colleges Sports Gala hosted at Kushinga Phikelela National Farmer Training College. Here Peer Educators, like any other health fair, distributed IEC materials, promoted our toll-free 577, performed condom demonstrations, and createed a youth-friendly and safe space for discussion and collective responsibility to maintain sexual and reproductive health.

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The Information village became an attraction for students, who eagerly accessed the onsite services provided by the Zimbabwe National Family Planning Council (ZNFPC) including HIV testing, and long-term contraceptive methods.


SRH Community Champions, SRH Defenders & TB Champions

Through the SET project, 200 young people across 5 countries were identified and trained as SRH community champions to play a crucial role in shaping SRH information dissemination at the community level. In Zimbabwe, 20 students were equipped as SRH defenders and TB Champions to advocate for youth friendly HIV & TB services, monitor the service quality, and participate in reflection action meetings and Technical Working Groups.

During the 22nd edition of the International Conference on AIDS and STIs held in Zimbabwe, TB champions presented abstracts on information gaps within TB programming as well as participated in a plenary session on ending inequalities to end TB and HIV alongside the NTP and Stop TB Partnership Zimbabwe.









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Select SRH Community Champions and SRH Defenders also participated in the conference leading the Condomize! Campaign in the Conference community village.

SRH defenders also actively participated in the Demand Reduction Committee of the Interministerial Committee of Drugs and substance Abuse educating communities and referring individuals in need of treatment and rehabilitation.

Young Researchers Initiative Program

As in the past 2 years, 35 students from across Southern Africa were enrolled in the 2023 Young Researcher's initiative program where they were mentored as research fellows to produce health, education, and child protection research papers to meet our commitment of evidence-based advocacy.

While five of the research benefited the SET project with articles on Menstrual Health Management, and youth-friendly service provision, the 2023 cohort primarily focused on emerging issues of drug and substance abuse and mental health. The research fellows had the opportunity to present their research findings to parliamentarians during SAYWHAT 3rd edition of the Research Indaba.

The Deputy Director of Reproductive Health Dr Lucia Gondongwe commended the research fellows and reiterated the government commitment to eradication of drug and substance abuse among the youth.

During the Indaba, Ambassador Per Lindgärde, Embassy of Sweden supported the launch of SAYWHAT's first research-based book titled "Empowering Young Voices: Unveiling the hidden realities of young people in Zimbabwe" which covers 10 SRH articles – a soft copy is available on our website.




Youth Focused Knowledge and Information Sharing

We generate knowledge on health and education to provide information that enables all young people and their support structures including school nurses and student affairs departments to better respond to education and health challenges or needs. Programming focuses on creating and producing broadcast knowledge that is shared via various media channels including print, social media, radio, and TV.

Throughout the year, efforts were made to generate youth-focused knowledge through mobilization of students and young people to participate in the **Studio of Choice** talk shows i.e., Research Insights, the Legal and Radar Talk Shows . In addition, students also contributed to the **SAYWHAT Observer newsletter** with storytelling pieces. Information was shared through SAYWHAT social media platforms and broadcasted in partnership with local radio stations including STAR FM, Skyz Metro and 98.4fm. As SAYWHAT celebrated **20 years of championing SRHR** for students and youth majority of the topics focused on SRH and GBV, however, more topics focused on other public health themes in particular the emerging scourge of drug and substance abuse.



Monthly, an average of 193,422 individuals had contact with the SRH and public health information disseminated via social media with Facebook as our major platform for reaching the target audience - students and young people.



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Similar interventions under the SET project - community dialogues, SRH service fairs, radio shows and social media campaigns collectively reached 10,359 young people across Angola, Malawi, Mozambique, Zambia, and Zimbabwe.

To add on to generation of youth-focused information sharing 12 female and 12 male students from 12 institutions of higher learning participated in the 5th edition of the public health, education, and child programming televised knowledge game. Amplifying SAYWHAT **20th anniversary** the challenge took place on the 15th and 16th of June from the Studio of Choice under the theme "Two decades of changing the paradigm: harnessing the power of information in nurturing public health discourse and advocacy". The quiz question for the 2023 edition focused on: -

- Family planning and contraception
- STIs, HIV, TB, and cancer of the reproductive system
- Gender Based Violence including Sexual Exploitation and abuse.
- Menstrual Health Management
- Post Abortion Care
- Drug and Substance Abuse
- Mental Health Management
- Climate Change and the environment.

Participating students displayed retention of health information from SAYWHAT interventions. Students from the National University of Science and Technology demonstrated their intellectual prowess on SRH, GBV, MHM, DSA, mental health and climate winning the 5th edition and taking the roving trophy from the defending champions Harare Institute of Technology.

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The 5th edition of the SAYWHAT Quiz Challenge was broadcasted on DStv Mindset Channel 319 every Saturday at 12:00 noon from the 12th of August – 4 November 2023 and the show reached up to 480,000 weekly views in the SADC region. All episodes are available on SAYWHAT YouTube.

SASI Debate Challenge

12 female and 12 male students from 12 institutions of higher learning also participated in the 6th edition of the televised intellectual battle, the Speak And Solve Initiative – another SAYWHAT youth-focused flagship event. To continue amplifying 20 years championing sexual and reproductive health for students and youth the challenge took place on the 19th and 20th of June at the Studio of Choice under the theme "A rhythm of Sexual Reproductive Health, Our Safety, Our right." Students debated on the following motions:

- 1. That the sex education curriculum should overstate and exaggerate the risks associated with sex.
- 2. THBT that schools should be held liable for sexual harassment committed by their students and staff members.
- 3. THBT that out of court settlements for crimes related to sexual harassment should be banned.
- 4. THS the explicit expressions of female sexuality in the entertainment industry.
- 5. THR herd immunity to eradicate TB.
- 6. THBT negative emotions such as depression should be viewed as abnormal.
- 7. THBT countries should work on adapting to climate change rather than trying to prevent it.
- 8. THR the Tinashe Mugabe DNA show

Students showcased their ability to contribute solutions to the challenges of their time with Midlands State University winning the debate and taking the roving trophy from the University of Zimbabwe. Like the Quiz Challenge, SASI was broadcast on the DSTV mindset channel 319 every Sunday from the 13th of August – 5th of November 2023 reaching over 480,000 viewers in the SADC region every week. All episodes are available on SAYWHAT YouTube as well.





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

The Creative Reproductive health Arts Festival for Transformation

Strengthening youth-focused information generation were 4 Male and 3 female students who participated and won the CHASE competition last year during the 1st edition of our Creative Reproductive health Arts Festival for Transformation. The 7 were capacitated in their respective fields of drama, music, poetry, and public speaking and they produced a short SRH-GBV film titled "CHOICES" and its theme soundtrack "iThemba".

CHOICES is a compelling and insightful film that delves into the intricate challenges faced by students in institutions of higher learning. It unflinchingly exposes the perils of semester marriages, substance abuse, sexual consent while exploring the insidious role of power and financial dynamics in shaping these issues.

iThemba an isiNdebele word meaning 'hope' soundtrack aimed to give young people hope considering the challenges they face attracting the attention of radio stations including Power FM & Skyz Metro. Young people took ownership of CHOICES and iThemba and as we work towards the 2nd edition of CRAFT next year, the two products remain a source for engaging young people in dialogue, raising awareness on SRH-GBV issues, and encouraging smart choices.

Advocacy and Campaigning

Efforts are dedicated to lobbying and advocating for policy and structural changes at schools, community, and national level advocacy projected at regional levels to ensure a supportive environment and adequate resources that supports the health and education of all young people.

Our work continues to be structured in a way that it influences policies and structures at all levels towards an environment which is responsive and addresses continued health and education challenges of children, adolescents, students, and youth.

Local Level

- At the National University of Science and Technology in Zimbabwe SAYWHAT advocacy contributed to the development and adoption of a Sexual Harassment Policy towards a harassment free environment.
- At Gwanda State University in Zimbabwe advocacy on Sexual Harassment led to the institution policy being disseminated via the student's portal to increase policy awareness among the student population.
- Mutare Teachers College in Zimbabwe established an Early Childhood Development Centre at the college following SAYWHAT participation in public hearings advocating for maternal health services for female students at tertiary level.

National Level

- SAYWHAT participated in different Technical Working Groups including Gender and Health and Family Planning representing and pushing for the needs of young people.
- SAYWHAT strengthened its advocacy work on TB with TB champions involvement in the National TB Program
 coordination meetings and we were part of the 2023 UNHLM preparatory planning processes, assessments, and
 development of key asks.
- SAYWHAT hosted its 13th edition of the National Students Conference and facilitated the engagement of research fellows, movement structures Web for Life and Mugota/Ixhiba members, TB Champions and SRH defenders with policy makers a platform for young people to propose solutions to the challenges of their time.

Regional Level

- SAYWHAT developed a toolkit to guide the advocacy work of SRH Community Champions including their participation in national Technical Working Groups and Youth Conferences in the respective countries.
- In Malawi, SAYWHAT contributed to the commissioning of an analysis of the 2022/23 draft national budget & advocated for an increase in the national education budget leading to a 12% nominal increase.
- In Malawi, SAYWHAT also advocated for conducive learning environments for girls with disabilities leading to the removal of Value Added Tax on sanitary wear in the 2023/24 national budget a milestone in reducing financial barriers and ensuring better access to menstrual hygiene products for girls.
- In Zambia, SAYWHAT undertook a comprehensive analysis of the 2024 education sector allocations in the 2024 National Budget which was presented to Parliament by the Minister of Finance in September 2023, a significant contribution to the review and allocation of additional resources to the education sector.
- SAYWHAT participated during the 10-year review of the Addis-Ababa declaration commitments in Zimbabwe.

Page 15 SAYWHAT participated in the 3rd International Quality Education Conference in Tanzania, emphasizing the importance of access to education, teacher recruitment, and the utilization of information and communication technology (ICT) in education.

International Level

- SAWHAT joined other Civil Society Organizations in the development of VNR shadow reports which were subsequently presented at the High-Level Political Forum (HLPF) in New York in July 2023.
- SAYWHAT participated in the African Regional Forum on Sustainable Development (AFRSD) 2023 conference in Niger, where we shared best practices and contributed to consolidated contributions from the African continent for the HLPF.
- SAYWHAT in collaboration with other education coalitions participated in the SDGs progress report that was submitted at the 2023 UNGA in September.

In-school Awareness Campaigns

SAYWHAT recognized the emerging scourge of drug and substance abuse among adolescents and young people in Zimbabwe. Therefore, on the campaign arm, SAYWHAT partnered with the Ministry of Primary and Secondary Education and we hosted in-school awareness campaigns aimed at appealing to adolescents to make drug free choices for the good of their health and future.

SAYWHAT also implemented an anti-bullying campaign across primary and secondary schools promoting our toll-free 577 to report any kind of abuse. These campaigns contributed to an increase in calls received at the Call Center and the number of children assisted through out the year.













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Keep the Girls Safe Campaign

SAYWHAT recognizes the plight of the girl child who is generally the victim of child marriages, unequal opportunities, gender-based violence, and discriminative religious and cultural practices. During the 2023 National Students Conference, the SAYWHAT Web for Life movement launched the Keep the Girls Safe Campaign that sought to ensure creation for safer inclusive environments for Adolescent Girls and Young Women (AGYW) in marginalized communities such that they can amplify their voices and stand for their rights. Adolescents and young mothers strengthened the launch sharing lived realities including dropping out of school due to teenage pregnancies.

The young women spearhead pledges by delegates and stakeholders to fight socio-cultural imbalances which perpetuate abuse of the girl child.

Orathon

SAYWHAT recognizes the consequences that gender-based violence have on developmental-impacts of girls and young women resulting in adverse impacts on their education such as low academic performance, aggressive behaviors towards peers, disturb on their mental health, school dropouts and early child marriages. At the 2023 National Students Conference which took place during the 16 days of Activism against gender-based violence on women and girls, SAYWHAT joined the global movement with its flagship Orathon .

The **Orathon** a title that combines the color theme of the global movement "orange" and the word "marathon" was joined with 267 runners 140M/127F who reflected the collective effort needed from both men and women to prevent violence against women and girls. In the previous years, men run an 8km route separate to women and when they meet at the 8km peg they continue together for another 8km to reach 16km against gender-based violence.

This year was, however, unique with men and women running a 20km route to celebrate **SAYWHAT 20 years of championing SRHR** for students and youth across Africa.









Condomize! Campaign

Health and Child Protection Services

We partner with health service providers, government, key stakeholders in child programming and manage telehealth service referrals to strengthen our capacity to directly offer commodities, clinical and preventative health services to children, adolescents, youth, and students and reduce their vulnerabilities, gender-based violence, unintended pregnancies, child pregnancies and improve HIV outcomes.

Since 2020 when SAYWHAT launched its toll-free 577 telehealth service (Call Center) in Zimbabwe, we have been working towards strengthening partnerships with different clinical and non-clinical service providers who delivers health and child protection services.

This year SAYWHAT partnered with over 50 service providers including the Department of Social Development and the Zimbabwe Republic Police Victim Friendly Unit.

Across SAYWHAT structures, the Child Protection Unit, the Web for Life Network, Mugota/Ixhiba, Peer Educators, TB Champions, SRH defenders and research fellow's efforts were made throughout the year to promote 577 and make SAYWHAT a drop center where students and young people who require psychosocial support and counselling can come through for assistance. By strengthening the referral system SAYWHAT ensured the provision and utilization of services by young people who call the Call Center and visit the SAYWHAT resource centers located across the institutions of higher learning.

The Launch of SAYWHAT Smart Learners Hub







During the International Day of the Girl Child, the Web for Life Network took lead in launching the SAYWHAT online SRH course – the Smart Learners Hub at the Studio of Choice with the theme "Digital Generation, Our Generation." The Smart Learners Hub provides free SRH courses and certification upon completion.

By year end, **388** young people were enrolled on Smart Learners Hub, with **177** completing all modules increasing their knowledge on SRH.



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SRH Community Champions also actively led SAYWHAT participation in local commemorations within Angola, Malawi, Mozambique, Zambia, and Zimbabwe. While the Web for Life Movement and the Mugota/Ixhba Young Men's Forum led commemorations visibility through online and physical dialogues in Zimbabwe. As we work towards addressing the emerging health challenges for children, adolescents, students, and youth SAYWHAT recognize the need to #MakeaNoiseAboutMen. In 2024, efforts will be made to review and influence national and regional commitments on the health rights and wellbeing of the boy child. Climate Change and its impacts make people, in particular adolescent boys and young men vulnerable to drug and substance abuse. Substance-abusing young people are vulnerable to depression and suicidal thoughts. As we champion Climate Action, SRHR, mental health, education rights and drug-free choices for girls and young women we will not leave the boy child behind.

Although, young people demonstrate knowledge on contemporary issues on their health and wellbeing during the flagship SAYWHAT Quiz, and SASI Debate Challenge, SAYWHAT noted the knowledge gaps that exist among young people on emerging challenges such as Climate Action and Non-communicable diseases. In 2024, SAYWHAT will strengthen its youth-focused knowledge and information sharing. There is also room to add other health modules on the SAYWHAT Smart Learners Hub beyond SRH.

SAYWHAT also recognizes that TB is once again the world's leading infectious killer, causing 1.3 million deaths in 2023 and among them children and People Living With HIV. However, despite being a high-risk to TB, children and young people often perceive low vulnerability to this infectious killer resulting in low utilization of TB screening, diagnosis, and treatment. In the year 2024, SAYWHAT desires to develop a **TB rights and treatment literacy manual** with children and young people as the target audience. In addition, champion the review and implementation of the new Education curriculum with age-appropriate TB facts.
