Students And Youth Working on reproductive Health Action Team (SAYWHAT) in partnership with the University of Botswana hosted the 5th edition of the South African Regional Students and Youth Conference (SARSYC) in Gaborone, Botswana from the 17th to the 19th of July 2024. SARSYC V ran under the theme "Building Bridges, Navigating Emerging Issues: Advancing Equitable Access to Public Health and Education" reflecting on ICPD30; the intersection between SDG4 and 5; Al, digital technology, and public health; emerging climate change, humanitarian crises, and disease outbreaks; and HIV, TB, and other communicable diseases.

I can confirm that the participants built the bridges between public health and emerging issues.

Further to that, SARSYC V provided a platform to facilitate knowledge exchange among students, young people, policymakers, Civil Society Organizations, and development partners promoting the sharing of insights and best practices to drive collective wisdom and innovative solutions for equitable access to public health and education. 255 delegates, among them 190 students and youth from Angola, Botswana, Tanzania, Eswatini, Kenya, Lesotho, Liberia, Malawi, Mozambique, Namibia, South Africa, Zambia, and Zimbabwe attended the conference and 65 were drawn from SADC PF members, college and university authorities, UN agents and other development players.




Web for Life Symposium
